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box on the survey. That means the average student in the U.S. must have a teacher who is struggling with English, because these 250,000 people are not just learning English, but mastering it. As the chart below shows, there is a big difference between ELL students and those who are learning English. Of course, this was one survey and doesn't prove anything, but it shows how commonly a person might be identified as an ELL. In fact, one survey of a different kind suggests that the number of English language learners is more than double the size of the ELL population. Why the difference between these two surveys? The answer lies with the survey questions. The first survey assumes that all students who check the "other" box have a problem with English. The second survey puts the question in a more sensitive way. It asks: "Are you a student of an ethnic language other than English?" Now, that question could be interpreted in two different ways.
